Passing through the five evolutionary stages described above, I believe, has created a legislative framework that, to a certain extent, protects the rights, freedoms and values of the majority of the peoples living in Europe today.

But since these stages are related to the issues of national minorities in general, and the linguistic component is only a part of the topic, it is more logical to combine the five stages, in three large groups, for simplicity of understanding and more concise presentation. And tell us more about each of them.

It should be noted that the work on the protection of linguistic minorities in Europe was not limited to the editing of international law alone. Local laws, constitutional norms and various institutions such as the church, for example, including cultural centers and educational institutions related to it, played a significant role. In the latter phase, political parties, trade unions and social movements became involved, owing mainly to the increasing role of minorities.

The first phase. Although the formation of international linguistic law in the region tentatively began in the mid-17th century, a brief historical excursion into the evolution of the protection of linguistic minorities should begin with the sixteenth century, the period of humanism and the development of reformist religious movements.
